





Document of the month: Album of Edward Mashiter,


#### Master of Foxhounds, D/DU 2708/1/2 Recently bought online by the ERO, this album was kept by Edward T. Mashiter of Great Burstead (1842-1921).

It is one of two surviving albums, one covering the years up to 1903, and this one the years 1908 to 1911. Mashiter was chairman of the brewers Ind, Coope and Co. Ltd of Romford, and master of the Essex Union Hunt, which is reflected in the newscuttings, photographs and other items contained in the albums.





He continued to grow and reached a height of at least 7 feet 9 inches or 237 cm, with some reports making him 8 feet 4 inches tall. He learnt basket making at Barnardo's Boys Garden City at Woodford Bridge, Essex but soon after joined Astley & Co's American Circus at Chigwell, Essex and toured the country. When not on tour he lived with his sister at Landermere, near Thorpe-le-Soken, Essex where he was pictured shaking hands with the landlady of the King's Head, Landermere – nothing too remarkable in that except that the landlady was on the first floor! Frederick was caught on tour in Berlin when the First World War broke out and was kept under house arrest for a month before returning to England.
